### PAST PRESIDENT'S REPORT

## Global Reflections from Laurie Hiemstra's Carousel Tour

In my role as the Past President, I had the privilege of representing the COA on an international stage during my Carousel tour this past year, engaging with the orthopaedic communities in the UK, South Africa, New Zealand and Australia. I am pleased to share the insights and learnings from these encounters.

In the vibrant city of Cape Town, at the South African Orthopaedic Association's 69th Congress, the prevailing theme was the pursuit of value-based care. The discussions confirmed a global challenge we are all too familiar with - advocating for a system that prioritizes patient outcomes and efficiency over mere financial metrics. The spirit of innovation, catalyzed by the disruptions of the COVID-19 pandemic, was palpable and resonated deeply with my beliefs in patient-first healthcare that we strive for in Canada.

The congress brought to light the pervasive issue of physician burnout. It was a stark reminder that seeking help is not just advisable but necessary for our well-being. Furthermore, the congress celebrated the rise of female surgeons in a historically male-dominated profession - a testament to the power of mentorship and diversity that echoed my own commitment to these values.

In Liverpool, the home of the Beatles, the British Orthopaedic Association's meeting focused on the sustainability of healthcare systems.

The discussions I participated in were not just about environmental stewardship but also about the sustainability of human resources in health. One profound realization was the environmental - and financial - impacts of our current practices, sparking a resolve in me to champion more ethical and sustainable approaches within our own systems.

The meeting in the UK was shadowed by troubling statistics on sexual assault and harassment within the surgical fields, prompting a necessary Town Hall to confront these issues head-on. It reinforced my conviction that leadership must foster a culture of respect and safety and that standing up against such behaviours is a responsibility for all.

One of the more striking messages I took away from these meetings was the pressing need for human health resources planning. The shortage of trainees is a global issue, and we must be proactive in addressing this gap to ensure the future of orthopaedic care.

In November, the Carousel travelled to Nelson, New Zealand and Melbourne, Australia. This trip was special due to the many surgeons from these countries who did Fellowships in Canada. It was also special as I took my 15-year-old twin boys with me. The theme in New Zealand was 'Perfecting Surgical Performance', focussing on doing the perfect operation and providing excellent care for patients.

In Melbourne, we began the day with the AORA (Australian Orthopaedic Resident's Association). They took advantage of the wide range of specialties amongst the Carousel to have a half-day review of orthopaedics. Australia is the country on the tour that most resembles Canada, in population, size and proportion of urban and regional sites. The theme for AOA was "Rural Surgery – Build it, and they will come'. Pulling from the experience of the practice of Dr. Chris Morrey, the outgoing President and a pelvic reconstruction and trauma surgeon in Cairns, there were multiple sessions on the challenges and triumphs of working in a regional centre. Incorporating rural electives, recruiting medical students from rural sites and other unique initiatives were discussed to encourage medical students and orthopaedic surgeons to consider regional sites to work.

Personally, bringing my boys along was very fulfilling. They participated in the opening ceremonies, representing their country well. For them, seeing their mother at work, on stage, and answering questions to a large audience gave them an insight into what I actually do when I am away, and why it seems I work so much. From the other perspective, it was one of the first times minor children had participated in the Carousel travel. This was enlightening for all, and I hope normalized and advanced the acceptance of women in leadership positions. By the end of the trip, the boys had 12 new 'aunts' and 'uncles' and were comfortable hanging out in an international crowd.

I return with a strengthened commitment to these international challenges, which are indeed our own. The shared experiences and solutions underscore the importance of our role in the global orthopaedic community. As we look forward, let us integrate these global insights to enhance patient-centric care, advocate for environmental responsibility, and ensure a culture of equality and safety within our ranks.

Let us carry these shared experiences into our future endeavours, ensuring that the COA continues to lead with innovation, compassion, and respect for all.







## TREASURER'S REPORT

I would like to extend my sincere gratitude for renewing your COA membership this year. Your support is essential for the Association's viability and contributes significantly to the development and implementation of programs and services that benefit our members and the wider orthopaedic community. As a member-based organization, where dues constitute 50% of our annual income, the COA greatly relies on your timely payment of annual membership dues and renewals.

This past year has been notable for the COA, marked by our investment in expanding our educational offerings. Despite the increasing costs in food and beverage, audio-visual services, and the impact of high inflation, which have elevated some operating expenses compared to the previous year, our prudent financial management has ensured that overall expenses remained within budget.


## **ASSOCIATION VISUAL REBRAND**

#### **GOVERNMENT RELATIONS AND ADVOORTHO**

In the Spring 2023 campaign leading up to Canadian Orthopaedic Care Day, the COA secured five meetings in British Columbia and two meetings in Prince Edward Island with executive health authorities and Members of Parliament. In the fall, in partnership with the Arthritis Society of Canada, we had four meetings with the offices of the Ministry of Finance, members of the HESA Committee, and the Ministry of Labour and Seniors. #### CANADIAN ORTHOPAEDIC CARE DAY

Occurring yearly on the last Wednesday of March, Canadian Orthopaedic Care Day was developed in the Winter of 2021 to unite the orthopaedic community to celebrate and bring awareness to orthopaedic care across Canada. The COA also involved allied health professionals, supporting organizations and government officials to participate by spreading awareness surrounding issues and challenges faced within the profession.

For 2023, the overarching theme was the right to live your life pain free, the increase in wait times, and recognizing the incredible dedication health professionals in orthopaedics provide.

Using the hashtags **#CdnOrthoDay**, **#OrthoCareCanada and #LiveLifePainFree**, we encouraged all orthopaedic surgeons, various health institutions and organizations, orthopaedic residency programs, as well as all provincial and federal government officials to participate by spreading awareness on Wednesday, March 29.

In addition to the over 1200 government officials (federal, provincial, municipal) whom we reached out to, we also contacted all health reporters and major news outlets across Canada, including community-based newspapers and media outlets, to help spread the word and request their support in promoting this important celebration and day.





#### **WEBINARS**

- CORA hosted a Coffee Chat with the COA
   Presidential Line in April where members of the COA's leadership shared valuable insights and lessons learned along their diverse career paths with residents from across the country. Pearls of wisdom were repurposed into a blog post coordinated by the CORA Chairs.
- In September, the COA teamed up with Healthcare Excellence Canada for an accredited webinar on Same-Day Surgery Implementation featuring a multi-disciplinary panel who shared valuable insights on the implementation of same-day surgery programs.
- In November, the COA Global Surgery Committee (COAGS) hosted an accredited webinar on
   Orthopaedics in Difficult Times featuring an international panel discussing the nuances of global surgery outreach during crises and exploring the significant Canadian contributions to orthopaedics on the world stage.
- Communication Webinar Interacting with the Media: Dana Miller, Manager, Communications, conducted a 60-minute webinar about the media's function and its interactions with the public and government. The webinar demystified the media's role in shaping public opinion and influencing governmental actions, emphasizing the transformation of medical communications into engaging narratives for the public.

#### **COURSES**

- Basic Science Course: In April: Module 4, "Neoplasia", attended by 76 attendees, completed the first full cycle of the virtual program. In October: Module 1, "The Basic Science of Basic Science", attended by 89 participants. Thanks are extended to Dr. Peter Glavas (Université de Montréal) and the Basic Science Course Committee, as well as the 11 course faculty over the two modules for their commitment to resident education and to this program. Supported by an independent educational grant from 3M Health Care, Medical Solutions Division.
- CAS/COA Intro to Arthroplasty Fundamentals:
  Junior residents had the opportunity to learn the basics of hip and knee arthroplasty in a virtual 2-part didactic and interactive course. Moderated by CAS President Dr. Eric Bohm and led by experts in lower extremity arthroplasty from across Canada, each 90-minute module covered a wide range of fundamental hip and knee arthroplasty topics and case-based breakout discussions. Supported by an independent educational grant from 3M Health Care, Medical Solutions Division.



#### **CONSENSUS MEETINGS**

In partnership with Obesity Canada, and led by COA member Dr. Harman Chaudhry, the COA organized two information gathering sessions focused on developing a consensus statement about **Obesity and Joint Replacement**. Over two virtual meetings, a total of 87 registrants representing the care team from community, rural, academic and emergency sites were

welcomed to themed breakout sessions, guided by 9 facilitators. The group covered a range of pre- and postoperative issues such as patient assessment for surgery, infection prophylaxis, TXA/DVT prophylaxis, wound closure, physiotherapy/rehab considerations and long-term follow-up. The group will begin drafting its findings in 2024.

#### **ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

Under Dr. Marcia Clark's expert leadership, the Annual Meeting, held in Calgary from June 21-24, was a resounding success. The event embraced the key guiding principles of advocacy and policy change, diversity, leadership, and a spotlight on local initiatives.

Critical issues were highlighted through insightful discussions and strategic planning, while the inclusion of the Care Team abstract track and sessions dedicated to OR efficiencies and environmental stewardship underscored a commitment to advancing a teambased approach to care. Diversity took centre stage, as evidenced by multidisciplinary panels, a session featuring Pride Ortho, and a Canadian Orthopaedic Nurses Association pre-day Annual Meeting.

Moreover, the event shone a spotlight on local initiatives, with three sessions exploring successful care delivery and advocacy models in Alberta. This comprehensive approach ensured that the Annual Meeting not only addressed current challenges in the orthopaedic landscape but also provided a platform for collaboration, learning, and the exchange of innovative ideas.





#### MENTOR FOR A DAY

The Mentor for a Day Program, a standout feature of the Annual Meeting in Calgary, matched 14 resident mentees from orthopaedic training programs across the country with experts and leaders from various subspecialties for a day of mentorship and focused discussions throughout Subspecialty Day on Saturday, June 24. This program provided residents the opportunity to learn first-hand from subspecialist

surgeon mentors about practice, techniques, research and career development in different specialty areas of orthopaedics. #### EARLY EXPOSURE TO THE CUTTING EDGE

#### Canadian Shoulder and Elbow Society (CSES)






- CSES hosted 4 travelling fellows from the British Shoulder & Elbow Society at the Annual Meeting.
